

The Episcopal Church in Action

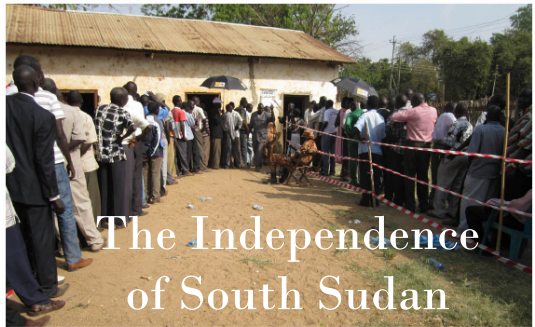
On July 9, South Sudan will celebrate its birth as a new African nation, separate from northern Sudan. In January of this year, a referendum took place in South Sudan, and over 90 percent of its people voted to secede from the north.

Although the Comprehensive Peace Agreement of 2005 had allowed for several years of

relative peace between the war-torn north, which is largely Muslim, and the south, which is largely Christian, as the independence of South Sudan approaches, violence has again erupted. On May 21, troops from Khartoum in northern Sudan attacked the oil-rich town of Abyei, located on the border of Sudan and South Sudan. Tens of thousands of civilians have had to flee their homes as the Sudanese army set fire to the town. Although agreement was reached between South Sudan and the north to demilitarize the Abyei region and to deploy Ethiopian peacekeeping troops in the area, and for the northern army to withdraw entirely from Abyei by July 9, continued violence is expected.

Now more than ever, it is important to “study, act, and pray” as Presiding Bishop Katharine Jefferts Schori urged Episcopalians to do before the Sudanese referendum earlier this year. In response to the recent resurgence of violence, Archbishop Daniel Deng Bul Yak of the Episcopal Church of Sudan, wrote the following on June 14: “We appeal to the international community, particularly the signatories of the Comprehensive Peace Agreement, to unite and do everything in their power to intervene quickly and to stop the fighting and the killing of innocent people, and to protect those residents of Southern Kordofan and Abyei who are Christian and African and, as a result, are suffering persecution. Genocide is highly likely without international mediation.”

The Episcopal Church of Sudan is based in the southern capital of Juba and, with more than 4 million members, is one of South Sudan’s largest civil-society institutions. The Episcopal Church of Sudan has lived through years of violence, war, and subjugation by the northern government; now South Sudan’s secession presents its own challenges. Of particular concern are Sudanese Episcopalians based in the north and will presumably remain citizens of a new Sudan that no longer claims the Christian south as citizens. Protecting the rights of northern Christians will be important now that the South is seceding. Similarly, steps to protect the rights of Muslims and others who belong to minority religions in the south will be vital.
